- SoCalREN Welcome & Revisiting Advisory Committee Purpose (Lujana Medina)
 - Minh Le (SoCalREN/County of Los Angeles) kicked off the meeting by welcoming all Advisory Committee members and invited guests to the 2020 Q2 meeting
 - Thanked everyone for joining, especially to discuss challenges due to COVID-19
 - Mentioned that EE services are essential and will help our communities reduce costs and save money while making positive climate impacts
 - A big opportunity to help rebuild our communities

- Can apply a lot of the lessons learned from the 2008 recovery act to COVID-19
- Schools are a great example of an opportunity coming out of the COVID-19 crisis
- We will also need to rebuild and better train our workforce in order to serve our customers
 - We will come out better on the other end!
- Lujana Medina (County of Los Angeles) reiterated Minh Le's points and once again thanked all participants for attending today's meeting
- COVID-19 Response - Opportunities for Collaboration (Minh Le/Lujana Medina)
 - SoCalREN Response
 - SoCalREN programs are continuing
 - No hold on budget at this time
 - Programs & activities are moving forward to provide critical EE support services and maintain momentum to achieve goals
 - Projects continuing or being pushed-out
 - Developing "shovel ready" projects
 - Shovel ready projects are important so if there is a stimulus of some form, we will be ready to go
 - Safety guidelines and protocols in place
 - SoCalREN will share the safety guidelines/protocols with the Advisory Committee (ACTION ITEM)
 - Remote audits and remote activities
 - Site-visits restarting May 18th
 - Site audits, on-site benchmarking, post installation activities
 - Any meetings with the SoCalREN team will continue to be done remotely for the time being
 - To ensure the safety of all persons participating in these activities, we will be following COVID-19 safety requirements and guidelines to adhere to the County Public Health and CDC social distancing order
 - Continuing WE&T and Financing program activities will play a critical role this year
 - Public sector impacts
 - Forecasting 63% to kWh goal
 - Only 2 projects withdrawn, 43 projects pushed out, rest of projects continuing
 - Responses from agencies have varied

- Shifting staff priorities & roles within agencies
 - Reduced and remote facility staff available to support project development
 - Staff pulled into Emergency Response
- Project implementation hurdles
 - IOU Inspections & pump tests on-hold
 - Delays in site-visits for audits
 - Delays in acquiring construction materials
- Anticipating funding challenges with changing priorities
- Loss in tax revenues for local governments
- Residential sector impacts
 - Expecting about 30% to goal
 - Pipeline momentum suspended, projects to continue but likely at a reduced rate
 - MF financial impacts due to loss of rental revenue
 - Properties limiting projects to emergency replacements
 - Temporary limited ability to access residential units as a result of stay at home order
 - Project pipeline full but with a mid-year start
 - Delays in on site-visits for energy audits
 - Implement Covid-19 safety guidelines to minimize on site risk
 - Anticipating funding challenges with changing priorities
 - Project financing to overcome cost barriers
- SoCalREN Ramp-up activities in response to COVID-19
 - Focus on COVID-19 Opportunities
 - Public sector
 - Water/wastewater focus
 - Relatively recession proof segment with a vast potential of operational energy savings
 - Specialized consultant now under contract to support engagement and enhanced program and project implementation
 - Agency targeting assessment for agencies with publicly available data
 - Increased support for school districts
 - Current shutdowns pose great opportunity for retrofits and building optimizations
 - Coordination with SCE School's Account Representative to identify engagement strategies
 - Identify outreach and partnership channels and opportunities in

- the Inland Empire
- Kim Fuentes (SBCCOG) asked if the SoCalREN has materials on EE opportunities for schools we can send out?
 - Lujana Medina (SoCalREN/County of Los Angeles confirmed that we have materials and SoCalREN can work with regional partners to provide co-branded templates to be distributed through partner communication channels (ACTION ITEM)
- Residential sector
 - Emphasize comprehensive common areas
 - Can easily be supported with social distancing protocols; simple collection of information on existing Common Area equipment through a simple intake process and offer facilities/property management in-unit “install” kits that can be verified by mobile photos
 - Assessment reports would be delivered remotely and would only detail Common Area measures. The minimum 10 percent savings threshold would be relaxed, with a proportionally reduced incentive rate
- Capacity Building
 - Public sector
 - Energy Audit training for facilities maintenance
 - Provide certified training for public agency facilities managers and or energy champions
 - On-site benchmarking and understanding building intensity/optimization
 - Residential sector
 - Certificate Training opportunities for small business contractors
 - Leverage the SoCalREN WE&T program to provide capacity regarding energy auditors for disadvantaged workers
- Marketing and Outreach
 - Public sector
 - *Conversations with SoCalREN* – webinar series that provides up to date information and highlights regional needs

- Local agency marketing materials that engage and educate their communities about ongoing sustainability opportunities
- Residential sector
 - Kits for Kids
 - *Kits for Kids* - These kits would provide simple, self-install measures such as LED bulbs and nightlights, faucet aerators, and smart power strips, as well as information on behavior change strategies that are easy for kids and parents alike to implement.
 - Will play a long term role of continuing to engage the community and incite the importance of energy savings
 - Sona Coffee (City of Irvine) asked how will the Kits for Kids be distributed
 - Lujana Medina (SoCalREN/County of Los Angeles) confirmed SoCalREN will distribute this kits through school districts via the Public Agency Programs
 - Forward-looking issues
 - Address economic impacts and job losses by providing access to capital
 - Invest in on-bill financing, RLF
 - Streamline incentives process requirements

- Fast track development of future local government renewable energy, storage and microgrids projects
 - Microgrid PD strong foundation
 - Allocate funds to DER
 - These strategies, if not already launched, will be launched by mid-year (June)
 - SoCalREN will look to the Advisory Committee to provide feedback on these new tools and services and you can be an advocate within your region
- Opportunities Discussion (Breakout Sessions)
 - How has your role shifted and what are you doing to ensure EE and other sustainability-related projects continue?
 - Alelia Parenteau (City of Santa Barbara) - Still in a holding pattern to understand budget/revenue impacts; City is lucky to have own internal RLF that will help projects move forward; Anticipating federal funding support in order to continue to prioritize future EE and resilience projects -- this will be crucial for all agencies
 - Sona Coffee (City of Irvine) - Projects are on hold, ex: hiring freeze for energy analyst position, need to now do more with less -- holding on new projects, ex: Climate Action Planning
 - Stephanie Cadena (GCCOG) - Relying on SoCalREN as they do not have EE programs; City staff does not have time because of day to day emergent opportunities
 - Pam Bold (HSEF) - New partnership with SoCalREN; Shift in energy assistance funds through SCE; Outreach at food banks; Schools are indefinitely closing for the end of the school year; In our communities with so many joining with digital and virtual meetings we can get resources out easier than in person
 - Kelly Lynn (SBCOG) - Not able to have in person meetings; Board meetings/committee meetings virtual until July
 - Lujana Medina (SoCalREN/TEC) - Purchasing/hiring freezes right away; Significant shift in priorities; Retrofits still occurring in county facilities; Improvements have to be externally funded; Sustainability has become a lower priority
 - Antonia Graham (City of Fullerton) - Releasing RFP for EE work at all City facilities, as well as for renewable energy and EV
 - Anthony Segura (WRCOG) - Resilience planning; Finishing up street lighting; Doing community support with SoCalGas to enroll customers in CARE and FERA due to COVID-19
 - Ben Luncha (City of Palmdale) - Continuing energy/sustainability related work; SGIP funding applications; working towards launching CCA
 - What are the current pain points or barriers within your agency or community for continuing EE and other sustainability-related projects?

- Financing and uncertainty!
 - Shifting priorities; Smaller budgets; Adapting to a new virtual world
 - Nancy Pfeffer (GCCOG) - We are seeing from our member cities that EE project interest has just dropped off due to being in survival mode -- budgets are being cut, staff is being furloughed and we just don't know where we are going to land yet
 - Alelia Parenteau (City of Santa Barbara) - We are out of low hanging fruit and the city is now looking towards energy assurance (storage and things like that) as opposed to EE and the funding is tied to EE so it is challenging
 - Antonia Graham (City of Fullerton) - "We are even more broke than we were before!"
 - Ben Lucha (City of Palmdale) - Budget is really tight and council is not currently open to spending to save money in the future, but will re-evaluate; Also looking at ESCOs but staff keep getting pulled in other directions
 - Kim Fuentes (SBCCOG) - Technology barriers to working remotely; Difficult to get in touch with people due to remote working; Other priorities making it difficult to move on EE projects
 - What gaps or challenges do you foresee in the future for your agency or community to implement projects?
 - Money, money, money!
 - Ben Lucha (City of Palmdale) - These are unprecedented times, everyone seems to be a little apprehensive of doing things!
 - Nancy Pfeffer (GCCOG) - It would be really helpful if SoCalREN can provide some of these messages -- of why these projects are important for agency and community cost savings
 - Craig Perkins (SoCalREN/TEC) - It is about money but the problem with LGs is that they don't have their own money, but if these projects can be done with third-party financing and they can reduce their operating costs, it is a win win!
 - What do you see as short-term and long-term solutions to address these challenges?
 - The Advisory Group needs to continue these discussions as we move through this unprecedented time
- Working Group Updates (Laurel Rothschild & Lujana Medina)
 - Grant Working Group
 - Started in late 2019
 - Services include:
 - Eligibility/requirements review
 - Strategic support
 - Application coordination
 - Technical assistance including copy-editing and other support as needed

- Updates will be sent to all committee members via eblast as opportunities are identified
- Reach out to Laurel Rothschild (SoCalREN/TEC) when there is interest in requesting support on a specific opportunity (ACTION ITEM)
- Special calls may be convened pending specific opportunities
- In addition to future blasts, SoCalREN will share an Opportunity Tracker with all Advisory Committee members (ACTION ITEM)

 - Nancy Pfeffer (GCCOG) mentioned that this tracker is great!
 - Chris Moore (CPUC) mentioned that there will be a webinar on this next week he will forward the link to Laurel (ACTION ITEM)
 - Ben Lucha (City of Palmdale) asked if SoCalREN could help close the funding gap since SGIP does not provide 100% of financing, could SoCalREN help close the gap?
 - Rebecca Hausheer (SoCalREN/TEC) mentioned that the Public Agency Programs are actively looking for other financing opportunities, such as CEC loans and our team can always provide agencies with information, comparisons, and cash flow analyses
 - Lujana Medina (SoCalREN/County of Los Angeles) reiterated this point and pointed out that one of SoCalREN's core services is identifying funding and financing opportunities
- Resiliency Working Group
 - Purpose: to collaborate and create a blueprint/guidebook on the development and completion of resilience projects (ex: microgrids at critical facilities) with SoCalREN communities
 - Sona Coffee (City of Irvine) requested that if Advisory Committee members have key points they would like to see incorporated into the blueprint/guidebook to please let the Working Group know! (ACTION ITEM)
 - Approach: SoCalREN will support conversations and information sharing among Working Group members related to specific activities and projects
 - Resources will be shared with other Advisory Committee members on a quarterly basis

- Goal: develop tools and guidance that can be utilized within SoCalREN Communities for resilient projects
- Lujana Medina (SoCalREN/County of Los Angeles) will send out a doodle poll as a next step to set up first coordination meeting (ACTION ITEM)

- SCE Public Sector Solicitation Working Group
 - RFA is scheduled to be released November 2020 (early Q4)
 - Purpose: to explore strategies and exchange ideas that can be used to develop an abstract/proposal to SCE for the upcoming Public Sector Energy Efficiency Solicitation.
 - Approach: regular calls among interested parties to determine teams and strategies. Participation in this working group is outside the scope of SoCalREN activities and will be led by the County of Los Angeles.
 - Goal: develop a cost-effective public sector resource program(s) that can be submitted by interested Advisory Committee members in approximately November 2020 to SCE
 - Current members include:
 - Antonia Graham, City of Fullerton
 - Joe Susca, City of Culver City
 - Katie Ward, SGVCOG
 - Sona Coffee, City of Irvine
 - Lujana Medina, County of Los Angeles
 - Why participate?
 - SCE eliminated non-resource funding for LGPs in 2020 with no plans to reestablish
 - SCE enhanced incentives will also be eliminated
 - SCE to outsource public sector to 3rd parties
 - RFA currently anticipated November 2020
 - Proposals need to demonstrate contribution of EE savings (Resource Program)

- Local Governments are eligible to submit proposals as part of a team or single-agency
- Funding will be outside and in addition to SoCalREN public sector funding
- Nancy Pfeffer (GCCOG) asked what it means to “demonstrate contribution of EE savings”
 - Lujana Medina (County of Los Angeles) clarified that when a project is done, SoCalREN has to submit to the CPUC how many savings are associated with that project
- Antonia Graham (City of Fullerton) asked if these EE savings could come from a business program that cities administer, like a Sustainable Business Cert program, or if these EE savings have to be from municipal projects
 - Laurel Rothschild (SoCalREN/TEC) confirmed that since this is specifically for the public sector, the savings need to come from public sector customers
- Antonia Graham (City of Fullerton) asked if an agency could potentially partner with a school district or a community college
 - Laurel Rothschild (SoCalREN/TEC) confirmed that community colleges are covered under a statewide effort and outside of scope but K-12 school districts are potential partners and any public agency eligible through SoCalREN could be covered
- Regulatory Updates (Marc Costa)
 - Potential & Goals (P&G) Study
 - Study defines how much EE potential exists
 - CPUC then adopts this to set EE goals for Program Administrators (PAs)
 - Comments focus on how the study is overhauled
 - SoCalREN and Joint REN comments focus on:
 - How to put EE on a level playing field with supply side resources in the Integrated Resource Plan (IRP)
 - Importance of non-resource activities as enabling elements of P&G outcomes
 - Focus on GHG reduction, customer cost reduction, meeting energy system needs
 - Kim Fuentes (SBCCOG) asked if there is an opportunity to provide input regarding the P&G Study and possibly be included with SoCalREN’s comments
 - Marc Costa (SoCalREN/TEC) replied, yes, absolutely but note that these comments will need to be wrapped up within the next

two days so just reach out as soon as possible so we can incorporate your comments (ACTION ITEM)

- R.13-11-005 Rolling Portfolio updates
 - COVID updates provide opportunities for program innovation; new program offering for workforce development brings new opportunities for engagement; LGP Co-benefits study may inform new IOU business plans; DEER 2022 updates will affect many measures including sunseting of indoor lighting; but bring NMEC opportunities
- R.19-01-011 Building Decarb updates
 - Proposed Decision - \$80M for BUILD (\$60M for low-income; \$120M for TECH Initiative)
 - 750 GWP refrigerant threshold
- A.19-08-013 SCE Increase in 2021 Revenues updates
 - Public notices did not show the full rate impacts
 - Sona Coffee (City of Irvine) mentioned that her SCE rep told the City there would be a 6% increase in April, and another 2% scheduled in June and mentioned that the City did not receive any notification on this
 - Marc Costa (SoCalREN/TEC) clarified that this is a separate rate case -- the rate increase he is referencing is expected to be about 20% starting in January 2021
- R.14-10-013 & R.14-10-003 Integrated Distributed Energy Resources (IDER)
 - Major Updates to Avoided Cost Calculator issued. Recognizes a cleaner grid for avoided GHG values; in some cases gives mid-day avoided costs more value
- R.19-01-011 Rulemaking Regarding Building Decarbonization
 - Pilot programs are being developed to decarbonize residential new construction as well as 'clean heat' technologies
- R.19-09-009 Rulemaking Regarding Microgrids
 - Interconnection rules and tariffs streamlined; electric battery charging rules changed; IOUs directed to work closer with LGs
- SoCalREN Programs Update (Program Implementers)

 - Highlights 2019 accomplishments
- Courtney Owen (SoCalREN/ICF) provided program updates on Residential Sector
 - Goal: Help Multifamily communities throughout the SoCalREN service area reduce energy use and provide a more comfortable, safer living environment for tenants through comprehensive property upgrades
 - Multifamily Program
 - Provides multifamily property owners with financial incentives to offset the cost of building upgrades that lead to ongoing energy savings.
 - Higher incentives are paid for projects located in Disadvantaged Communities.
 - Participating Contractors complete the upgrades, working with property ownership/management and SoCalREN Account Management and Engineering teams.
 - Eligible measures include HVAC, insulation, water heating, lighting, appliances, and more.
 - Residential Community Coordinator
 - The RCC Program performs direct outreach to property owners/managers who speak a primary language other than English (e.g. Spanish, Korean, Mandarin, etc.).
 - The RCC provides one-on-one support to help participants complete required documentation and other tasks as needed to

- ensure projects are completed successfully.
- The RCC Program seeks to hold webinars/seminars for property owners and managers in coordination with public agencies. We look forward to working together!
- Multifamily Financing
 - Through the Multifamily Financing Program, property owners can access capital to fund energy efficiency upgrades performed through the SoCalREN Multifamily Program.
 - Financing is offered at preferred rates negotiated by SoCalREN.
 - SoCalREN Account Managers will guide the participating property through the application process, which is completed through an online portal.
 - The Multifamily Financing Program is set to launch in June 2020.
 - Antonia Graham (City of Fullerton) asked if SoCalREN could send out any Multifamily collateral that we could push out
 - Meaghan Laverty (SoCalREN/TEC) replied that we can and SoCalREN will also be sending a registration link to our next webinar (5/27) which will provide templates for agencies to communicate these resources to their communities so stay tuned!
- Lujana Medina (SoCalREN/County of Los Angeles) provided program updates on WE&T Sector
 - Procurement Training and Support - E-Contractor Academy
 - Tailored strategy that offers training and step-by-step bid solicitation assistance from the beginning of an RFP to the award
 - Public Agency Bid Solicitation Training for Contractors
 - Workshop training to assist contractors (WMDVBE) in participating in specific Public Agency bid solicitation
 - SoCalREN programs Contractor Training
 - Workshop training that assist small business contractors and WMDVBE contractors in participating in SoCalREN EE residential programs
 - Youth Workforce Development - ACES Youth Program
 - Provides stackable certificates that includes a new energy/building technologies curricula to effectively build a pipeline of disadvantaged youth trained to enter into quality career jobs in the energy sector and provide paid internships
